Wisconsin Vietnam War Casualties

According to the Defense Casualty Analysis System, the total record count of deaths for Wisconsin is 1,161 as of April 29, 2008. (www.archives.gov/aad)

The month of March is 11th and April is 7th in the number of casualties for the State of Wisconsin. Wisconsin had 230 casualties overall for November and December during the duration of the war. Out of the group of 20 soldiers below, 5% Air Force, 50% Marines, 40% Army and 5% Navy paid the ultimate sacrifice.
