Chapter Tales

Ladies and gentlemen.

I am going to regale you fine folks with my story. Perhaps we need to set aside a page or two in our Newsletter for anyone that wants to tell of their past history.

Christmas for many is a time to give thanks; it always takes me back to a very difficult time, my early childhood years. I cringe at the thought, though I force my-self to take time to reflect on all that I have been given and all that I have accomplished in my lifetime.

Until I was 12 years old. I was a homeless orphan living on my own, sleeping in barns, and helping out local farmers for a decent meal. I never had new clothes and wore hand-me-downs from the neighbors. My shoes always seemed too small and caused ingrown toenails that I I still suffer to this day.

I went to a one-room school in the township of Maple Grove until 5th grade. The school was closed down so I was sent to St. Patrick's, Maple Grove, it was a mess. Since I was the new kid, everyone wanted to take the measure of me by fighting. With my rowdy upbringing, I could get the best of anyone that messed with me. I was an outcast, no one cared about me at all. I was not chosen for any school activities likeplays, or sports. I became a recluse; in seventh grade, I missed 46 days and in eighth grade, I missed 78 days of school. I was working for various farmers, and it didn't matter to anyone why I wasn't attending school. They just pushed me out and I went into high school.

At the age of twelve, the owner of a large dairy farm took me in. I was in heaven: they had indoor plumbing, running water, a TV, and I was fed three meals a day for the first time in my life. Work was hard from 5 AM until 8 PM, seven days a week, with three hours off on Sunday. The pay was room and board plus \$5.00 per week in the winter months, \$10.00 a week during the summer. I loved it, there was always something to do. I stayed with them thru my high school yearsI and never attended any high school events, because I was always working.

At 17 and out of school, was anxious to find out about bigger and better things.

There was a rumor of a war starting in Southeast Asia. I didn't want to miss it, so in August 1965, I volunteered for the draft, and did not care if I lived or died.

Well, I did get to live. I did a lot of stupid, idiotic stuff when I returned home. I was getting in fights with everyone, even with some of my friends that I had before my hitch in the service. I nearly killed one of them in a bar fight.

I had to get away from the area I called home, so I hired on with a roofing company that had crews working out of state. I worked for them for five years. then I hired on with a Water Tower erection crew. I have worked all over the US, and even built a tank in Puerto Rico. I made foreman in three years and stayed with them for 33 years retiring in August 2006. I think of all the foremen that I have trained, such great men to this day. One foreman that I trained passed away recently at 62 years of age, I grieve for his family.

Our memories make us rich. Would you agree?

With the COVID pandemic easing up a bit, let us look forward to a very busy year. Stay tuned for all the schedules.

Thanks to all who had anything to do with keeping our Chapter in the top echelon.

With that, I wish you all a happy New Year!


Propert "Bob" Gresens


